Sleep matters in healthy ageing

Sleep is more than rest - it's one of the body's important healing processes. While we sleep, the brain and body go into repair mode. Memories are organised, muscles recover, the immune system strengthens and energy is restored.

For older adults, good sleep is linked to independence and wellbeing. Quality sleep protects memory, supports clear thinking and may slow cognitive decline.

When someone is overtired, they may appear more confused or forgetful. This is not always dementia progression, but sometimes simply a lack of restorative sleep.

Sleep plays a major role in safety. Poor sleep affects balance, reaction time and concentration, increasing the risk of falls and night-time wandering. Residents who sleep well are generally steadier on their feet and more alert during the day.

The body also heals during sleep. Skin repair, tissue recovery and immune function all occur overnight. Consistent sleep helps the body fight infections and supports healing of wounds and pressure injuries.

Sleep strongly affects mood. Tiredness can lead to irritability, anxiety and agitation, and in people living with dementia may worsen "sundowning" behaviours. Improving sleep often improves behaviour and overall comfort.

At Crowley, we actively support healthy sleep habits for our residents. Caffeinated drinks are not served at supper to promote restful nights, and our team takes care to create a calm, comfortable environment by turning off lights, closing curtains, and ensuring room temperatures are just right for a good night's sleep.

It's a common belief that older people need less sleep, but most adults over 65 still require about **7-8 hours each night**.

Good sleep routines

Simple routines help support better sleep:

- Keeping regular bed and wake times
- Getting sunlight during the day
- Gentle daytime activity
- Limiting long daytime naps
- Maintaining a calm, quiet bedroom environment.

Good sleep supports memory, mobility, mood and recovery. In many cases, improving sleep can enhance quality of life as much as any treatment - it is an essential part of healthy ageing.

Maintaining good oral health

We are fortunate in Australia that people are now keeping their teeth for longer. As people age however, the need for dental care increases, which means more complex fillings and repairs as well as an increased prevalence and severity of gum disease.

Maintaining good oral health is important for our health and wellbeing, particularly for those with chronic and complex health conditions.

Issues that can contribute to poor oral health in older people include:

- reduced nutritional intake
- medication use
- multiple health conditions
- preference for sweet foods
- reduced ability to clean teeth effectively due to injury or impairment
- recurrent respiratory infections.

We can reduce the impacts of poor oral health by providing regular oral care assistance. Teeth should be cleaned twice daily, at a minimum.

Health impacts

Potential health impacts of poor oral health include:

- **Continence**
Being unable to chew foods with high fibre content can affect continence management.
- **Dementia**
People living with dementia are particularly at risk of developing complex oral disease as dementia impacts their ability to reliably report dental issues including dental pain.

- **Depression**

Reduced oral health may cause pain, discomfort, bad breath, and impact our ability to speak, sleep well and socialise. Importantly, it can make people feel self-conscious about their appearance leading to reduced social connections and isolation.

- **Medication**

Taking multiple medications can consistently cause dry mouth which makes speech and swallowing difficult.

- **Mobility**

Nutritional status may suffer as a result of poor oral health and this can lead to challenges maintaining weight, muscle mass and strength.

- **Skin Integrity**

Nutritional status impacts skin integrity and wound healing.

Looking after dentures

As well as caring for our natural teeth, it's important to look after dentures to keep our mouths healthy and reduce the risk of infection. Dentures should fit well and be cleaned daily with mild soap and water. Ideally they should be removed and cleaned after meals to remove food and debris. Toothpaste can be too abrasive for dentures and may cause scratches on the polish. It is recommended to remove dentures at night to allow your gums to rest. After cleaning and drying them, store dentures in a clean, dry container with a lid.

Dentures should also be sterilized each week using Sterident or a similar cleansing product. After soaking, rinse thoroughly, dry and store in a dry container until next use. Avoid leaving dentures sitting in water for long periods, as this can increase the risk of fungal and other oral infections.

Advice for carers

If you are caring for someone who needs assistance with oral care, always explain what you are going to do before assisting and allow time for them to respond. Use a soft toothbrush which can be gently bent if needed, or a mouth swab with a pea-sized amount of toothpaste. Some people find electric toothbrushes easier to use, while others may not be comfortable with them. Encourage the person to copy your actions or support them to brush their own teeth where possible. Check their lips and tongue, to ensure they are not too dry.

High fluoride toothpaste can be helpful although it may be costly for some. Reducing sweets and sugary drinks between meals and sipping water if your mouth becomes dry can also improve oral health.

If you are caring for someone who is unable or unwilling to allow assistance with oral care, seek professional advice to ensure their health and wellbeing are protected.

Ideally, visit your dentist every 6 months for a professional clean and check-up.

At Crowley, we prioritise good oral health as an essential part of overall wellbeing. Our Registered Nurses arrange allied health referrals for residents to see a dental hygienist when required. The dental hygienist visits Crowley to conduct comprehensive oral health assessments and provide appropriate care and recommendations as needed.

Remember to brush your teeth at least twice a day to maintain good oral health.

How to request maintenance and additional works

At Crowley, we are committed to ensuring your home remains safe, comfortable, and well maintained.

To help us respond promptly to all requests, we ask residents to follow the simple process below when reporting maintenance issues or planning any changes to their unit or apartment.

Reporting maintenance

If you notice something that needs attention, such as a repair or fault, please contact our Customer Service team by phone or by visiting reception.

Our staff will record your request in the **Maintenance Book** so it can be scheduled and assessed for action by our maintenance team.

To ensure requests are properly attended to, we kindly ask that residents do not approach maintenance staff directly.

Requesting works or modifications

If you are considering installing or upgrading items in your unit, please contact us before obtaining a quote from an external supplier (as outlined in the Retirement Village Contract).

We have **specifications information sheets** available for modifications such as:

- Screen rooms
- Air-conditioning units
- External awnings
- Retractable hose reels
- Foxtel connections
- TV antennas
- Power points
- Lighting
- Solar panels
- Ramps
- Bidets.

These guidelines help ensure all modifications comply with relevant building codes, safety regulations and standards while maintaining the appearance and harmony of the village.

Approval process

All proposed modifications require prior approval. To apply:

1. Collect an **Additional Works Request Form** from Customer Service.
2. Complete the form and attach a quote from your preferred supplier.
3. Return the documents to our office for review.

We will respond to requests in writing and if approved, include any conditions required for the works to proceed.

By following these procedures, you help us maintain a safe, well-presented, and welcoming community for everyone. If you have any questions, our Customer Service team is always happy to assist.

March is the start of our Autumn season and the month of Nutrition. Nutrition is essential for health and wellbeing for all of us not just our aged community because it provides the vital energy nutrients and fuel we require for our body to function grow and repair.

A balanced nutrient rich diet strengthens the immune system maintains a healthy weight boots mental health and reduces the risk of chronic diseases like diabetes, heart disease stroke and certain cancers.

The components of a healthy diet include a variety of foods:

- Staples like cereals (wheat and rice) legumes (beans and lentils) and starchy roots
- Produce: a variety of seasonal fruits and vegetables.
- Proteins & Dairy: lean meats, fish, eggs, and milk.
- Hydration: adequate water intake is essential for bodily functions.

Happy 100th birthday Valda!

Congratulations to Valda McLerie, who has recently become the newest centenarian in our Independent Living community. Valda celebrated her remarkable 100th birthday on 21 February, surrounded by family and friends at a beautiful and happy gathering.

Born in 1926 at the Summer Hill Private Hospital in Ashfield, Valda has lived through a century of extraordinary change. She married her beloved husband, Bill, on 6 June 1949. Their family soon grew with the arrival of their daughter Sue in 1951, followed by Belinda in 1953, completing their family of four.

Reflecting on her life, Valda says she is most proud of her resilience, her ability to enjoy life and her determination to make the most of whatever unfolds.

"I have had a fortunate life being surrounded by loving family, starting with my immediate family - my parents, grandparents, aunty, my brother and sister. Then when I married and started my family it was a natural progression of the importance of family and friends."



She fondly recalls Sundays spent gathered around the piano, singing together as a family. Later, she created similar memories with her own daughters, taking them to family and friends' gatherings where the children played while the adults enjoyed a game of cards.

Among her most treasured memories are riding in a horse and sulky with her grandfather and, years later, driving a car with her grandchildren - special moments that beautifully span generations.

Today, Valda's family includes her two beautiful daughters, Sue and Belinda, two son-in-laws, five grandchildren and 12 great-grandchildren, all of whom keep her grounded and connected and immensely proud.

Valda says moving into the Crowley Independent Living community 19 years ago was one of the best decisions she made. She loves socialising, regularly plays Mahjong, enjoys word searches to keep her mind active, and enthusiastically joins in community activities and social gatherings.

Her advice to fellow residents is simple: get involved and become part of the community.

When asked about her secret to a long life, Valda credits her positive attitude, staying busy, and remaining connected to family and community.

"Live a full life by being positive, laugh a lot - and most of all, laugh at yourself."

Born in Lismore at Don Grail Private Hospital, Betty Parrish grew up on a farm in Alstonville, where her father worked as a dairy and cattle farmer.

Her father owned three farms in the area and was awarded an MBE in the 1970s for his service to the dairy industry. “He was a great man,” Betty says proudly.

The youngest of eight children, Betty is now the only surviving sibling. As a child, she and her brothers and sisters travelled to Shaws Bay in Ballina for swimming lessons in the back of a big cream truck - long before seatbelts were around.

“Ballina was very different back then,” she recalls. “There wasn’t a lot there and most people would go to Lismore to shop.”

Betty attended Alstonville Primary School and completed her Intermediate Certificate before moving on to Lismore Technical College, where she studied secretarial studies and dressmaking. She became an accomplished seamstress, making all her own clothes and for her mother.

On a trip to Moss Vale, Betty stayed with a family friend who taught her how to drive so she could surprise her father when she returned home. Not long after, she met her future husband, Lewis, whose brother owned a farm opposite her parents’ property. Invited over by her father for a game of cards, Lewis met Betty for the first time - and soon asked her out. They married when Betty was 20.

Lewis trained for four years to join the Air Force and had travelled to Sydney to enlist, but the war ended just one day before he was old enough to enrol.

Married in 1954, Betty and Lewis built their home in Oliver Street, Lismore, and raised two children, a son and a daughter. Their son studied at Armidale University and became a maths teacher, while their daughter completed secretarial studies and now works alongside her husband.

Betty is also a proud grandmother to three grandsons and great-grandmother to five great-grandchildren.





For more than 16 years, Betty worked at the Karinga Motel in Lismore, once considered the best place to stay in town. Located opposite the swimming baths, it hosted many notable guests, including the Duke of Edinburgh, Dawn Fraser and members of Parliament.

Betty remembers working through the devastating 1954 floods, when staff raced to move belongings upstairs as water rose rapidly.

After retiring, Betty volunteered at the Naval Museum in Ballina each week. "I really enjoyed it," she says. "I would meet people from all over the world." She formed many friendships and missed it when she left.

Betty has enjoyed travelling, taking train trips to Perth and Darwin, visiting Cairns, Tasmania, Melbourne, Hawaii, America, Spain, North Africa, Singapore and England. A highlight was travelling through England and Europe with her three sisters.

28 years ago, Betty bought a home in Cherry Street, Sandpiper Court. "It was a lovely place to live," she recalls. "In summer, all the ladies swam in the creek every day, and we held Christmas parties each year where everyone brought a plate to share. We did that for 28 years."

Reflecting on her life, Betty offers simple but heartfelt advice: "Be happy, and enjoy what you're doing."

Beef and Guinness pie

Ingredients

- 2 kg beef chuck casserole steak
- 3 sliced onions
- 4 crushed cloves garlic
- 1 tbsp oil
- 2/3 cup plain flour
- 400ml guinness beer
- 2 cups beef stock
- 2 sheets ready-rolled puff pastry
- 1 beaten egg

Instructions

Brown beef in hot oil. Set aside. Cook onions and garlic in oil until golden. Sprinkle in flour and cook for 1 min.

Return meat and juices to pan, add Guinness and stock. Bring to the boil. Reduce heat, simmer for 2 hours until tender and sauce has thickened.

Preheat oven to 200°C. Spoon beef mixture into eight 250ml ovenproof ramekins. Cut out eight circles of pastry to cover. Press firmly onto dishes and seal. Brush with egg, place on a tray and bake for 25 minutes until golden. Freeze uncooked pies, wrapped in plastic then foil. Defrost before cooking.





Irish stew

Ingredients

- 1/4 cup plain flour
- 1.2kg lamb neck chops, trimmed
- 1/4 cup olive oil
- 1 brown onion, finely chopped
- 1 tbsp fresh thyme leaves
- 2 carrots, peeled, sliced
- 1kg desiree potatoes, peeled, cut into 2cm pieces
- 6 cups beef stock
- Fresh thyme leaves, to serve

Instructions

Place flour and chops in a snap-lock bag. Seal. Shake until chops are coated. Heat 1 tablespoon oil in a heavy-based saucepan over medium heat. Add onion and thyme. Cook, stirring, for 3 to 4 minutes or until tender. Transfer to a bowl.

Increase heat to high. Add 1 tablespoon oil. Add half the chops. Cook for 2 minutes each side or until browned. Transfer to a plate. Repeat with remaining oil and chops. Layer 4 chops and half the carrots, potatoes and onion mixture in pan. Repeat layers with remaining chops, carrots, potatoes and onion mixture. Pour over stock. Bring to the boil, skimming off fat when necessary. Reduce heat to low. Cover. Simmer for 1 hour 30 minutes, skimming off fat when necessary. Remove lid. Simmer for 30 minutes or until chops are very tender and sauce has thickened slightly.

Season with pepper. Top with thyme sprigs. Serve with crusty bread.

Update from Maintenance

Access and Safety in Your Home

At Crowley, we want your home to feel safe, comfortable, and easy to move around in. One area many residents find challenging is the shower.

As balance changes over time, stepping over raised frames can become risky. That's why our apartments have sill-less shower doors, where the door seal closes onto an aluminium D mould fixed to the floor. In our refurbished villas, shower floors are recessed by 10mm and shower doors are fitted with U-shaped channels to direct water flow to one side. Traditional shower frames can be at least 25mm high, so removing these helps make shower access safer and reduces trip hazards.

Because these showers don't have a door sill or hob, some water may escape onto the bathroom floor. Please take care to keep floors dry. If you use a shower mat, make sure water can still drain properly. Sometimes a small hole in the mat helps prevent water from building up.

Ramps and handrails can also make a big difference accessing your home, especially near patios and entryways. Residents may consider purchasing solid rubber ramps made from recycled tyres, designed to the correct 1:8 gradient where space permits. During villa refurbishments, we also fit magnetic door holders to keep screen doors open while you're coming and going.

If you have concerns about access in your home, an Occupational Therapist can help by assessing your mobility and suggesting the most useful supports and aids to install in your home.

Remember to submit an Additional Works Request form before any alterations are made.

Craft Corner

How to make St. Patrick's Day decorations

Add a festive touch to your St. Patrick's Day celebrations with this clever four-leaf clover decoration. While you're crafting maybe you can share an Irish joke or two!

What you need

- Green craft paper
- Scissors
- Glue
- String

Instructions

Cut strips of craft paper 3cm wide and 30cm long.

If participants have poor dexterity, trace the lines with a black marker and hand it to them to cut out.

Cut several strips and start assembling.

Fold one strip in the middle. The folded end is the bottom of the heart shape.

Put 1.5 inches (2 cm) of glue on the outside ends of the strip.

Take the two ends and bend inwards to glue together. The more you fold the glued parts the more it looks like a heart shaped figure.

Secure with a paper clip until it dries.

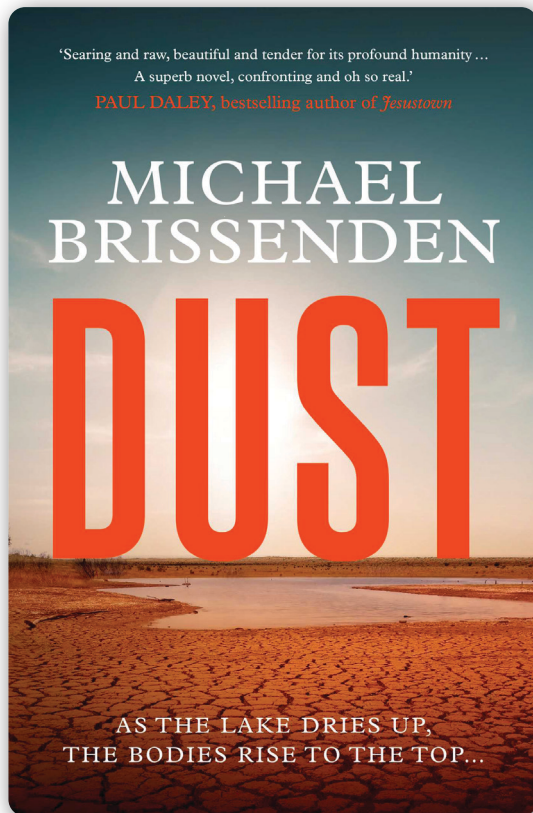
Glue the four pieces together making sure the folded ends meet.

Decorate walls, windows with blue tack or attach cotton yarn or make a garland and hang from the ceiling.

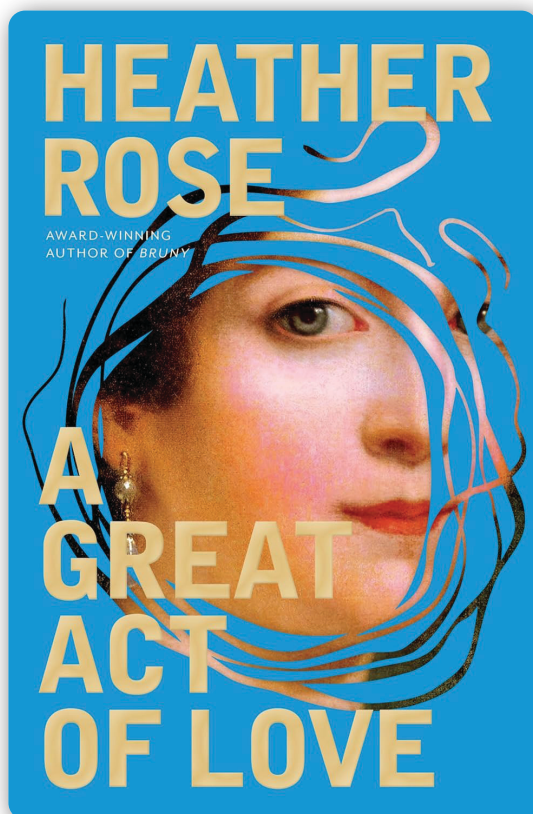
What did we think?

Harmony at Crowley can be seen in many small but meaningful ways. It is in neighbours sharing stories over a cuppa.

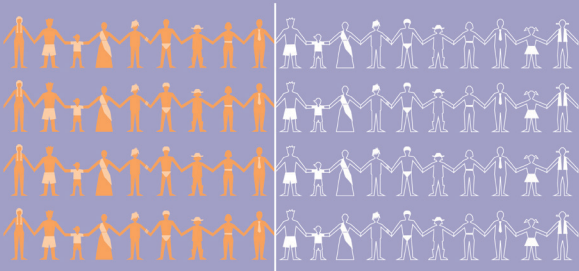

Under the new Strengthened Aged Care Quality Standards, aged care providers must demonstrate how they review, monitor and improve their services over time.

These strengthened Standards raise expectations and reinforce what matters most - safe care, dignity, respect and accountability.

At Crowley, continuous improvement means we are always looking for ways to make life better for the people who live here and for our clients.

What it means for you

Continuous improvement means we:

- Listen to our residents, clients, families, staff and stakeholders
- Learn from feedback, incidents and outcomes
- Make planned improvements
- Monitor whether those improvements make a positive difference.

It's now an embedded and measurable part of how aged care services are governed and delivered.

By fostering a culture of learning, evidence-based decision making and responsive care, we meet compliance requirements and help ensure our residents and clients receives safe, respectful and person-centred care.

Elements of continuous improvement

These principles guide our approach:

- **Person-centred focus** - placing each resident and client's needs, preferences and rights at the centre of decisions.
- **Innovation** - finding better ways to deliver care and services.
- **Involvement and accountability** of key stakeholders, including people receiving aged care, their representatives and carers, staff and volunteers, committee and board members, advocates.
- **Planned and structured actions** to address identified improvements
- **Regular monitoring and evaluation** to ensure changes are effective.

Continuous improvement benefits

Beyond meeting regulatory requirements, continuous improvement allows us to:

- Identify areas where care and services can be strengthened
- Improve outcomes and experiences for residents and clients
- Increase resident, client and family involvement
- Strengthen systems to monitor and track changes
- Achieve sustainable, long-term improvements
- And simply do things better.



How We Make Improvements:

We use a structured approach known as the Plan-Do-Check-Act (PDCA) cycle, a recognised continuous improvement model.

It includes four steps:

1. **PLAN** the improvement
2. **DO** implement the change
3. **CHECK** the results
4. **ACT** to standardise and sustain successful improvements.

This cycle helps ensure that improvements are thoughtful, measured and effective.
